What is the Prospect Rural Fire Protection District?

Board of Directors- responsible for Department policies, tax budget approval and oversight (ie- levies, financial execution, etc)

Fire Chief- responsible for Department Operations, personnel management

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N S **Responding Volunteers**- 911 response; maintain vehicles, equipment and supplies

Special Scope Volunteers- duties vary (admin/financial, grants, general, construction and/or maintenance)

PRFPD Volunteer Association- provide general Operational support

2023 Emergency Services Summary



Medical Calls- 150 (medical program not funded!)

Fire Calls- 63

Motor Vehicle Collision (MVC)- 12

Agency Assist- 6

Mutual Aid Calls- 24 (fire, medical and/or MVC calls out of *District- Shady Cove, USFS, Chemult*)

Why go through all that trouble?

DISPATCH: Chest Pains, Union Creek

Responders reached patient, recognized active heart attack, activated the helicopter, established LZ and transferred the patient in less time than it normally takes for a ground ambulance to get to Prospect!

Less than 60 minutes after calling 911 from Union Creek our patient was in emergency surgery.

Five days later he asked to meet the people that saved his life.





Operations Goals for 2024


- Recruit 4 more responding volunteers
